## Draft programme

### Thursday 18 June

We start with an afternoon focused on the broad policy context. John Craven, Vice Chancellor of the University of Portsmouth and previous Chair of the University Alliance, will speak on '*Institutional challenges and choices in economic curriculum design*'. Alan Palmer, HEFCE Policy Adviser, will ask '*Does credit make a difference to funding: if so how – for now and the future?*' The conference dinner will encourage networking and the short after-dinner presentation on '*Pitfalls of travelling without credit*' will engage more light-heartedly with a learner perspective.

### Friday 19 June

The sessions on Friday will focus upon models of current practice and allow useful debate on practical solutions and the way forward. '*Credit level descriptors; even more useful?*' will give an opportunity to preview and discuss the updated SEEC level descriptors, and new potential for their use. The parallel workshop topics will include AP(E)L, European convergence issues, module design and accreditation. The plenary will focus on identification of future areas for development.
