Background

[Vitae](#) in partnership with [UKRIO](#) have been commissioned by [Research England](#), on behalf of UKRI to undertake a research integrity landscape study. This project will consider the effects of incentives (drivers and motivators) in the research system on researcher behaviour in the context of research integrity, how these incentives are perceived by different stakeholders and the impact of these incentives on researcher behaviour and organisational practices more broadly.

The study involves a small number of researcher workshops and a large-scale survey, which will run during October.
